



Industry	A group of businesses which make or sell similar things.	I know that the Victorians were very industrial. Their cities were full of factories.	  
Secondary Source	Information created later by someone who did not experience first-hand or participate in the events. For example, a textbook or website.	I know that doctors (like Richard Russell) prescribed sea air to help people feel better. This made the seaside more popular.	
Past	A time or event earlier than now. We look at the past to research events before the current time.	I know that railways were built around Britain, this made seaside destinations more accessible.	
Bathing machine	Bathing machines were wooden carts on wheels that were rolled into the sea for people to change in	I know that we can use secondary sources to help to find out about what holidays were like in the past.	
Pier	A platform on pillars going from the shore into the sea, which usually has entertainment arcades and places to eat.	I know the difference between holidays today and holidays in the past.	
Promenade	A paved public walk, usually along the seafront.	I know what bathing machines were and how people used to dress in the Victorian times. A long time ago it was seen as rude or indecent for women to be seen in their bathing costumes so she would get changed in the bathing machine then jump straight into the sea without being seen.	
Paddle Boat	A boat powered by steam and propelled by paddle wheels.		
Penny lick	A penny lick was a small glass for serving ice cream. It would cost just one penny. The customer would lick clean the glass and return it to the vendor, who would reuse it.	I know the Wright brothers built the first successful motor operated aeroplane 1903. I can explain how aeroplanes have changed holidays.	
Steam train	A train that is powered by a steam engine.	I know that Weymouth was the first seaside resort in Britain and was established more than 200 years ago.
